## WHAT/S ALL THE TALK ABOUT A REFERENDUM

## From our school

Administrator, Mr. Joseph Leschisin:

Early in 2022, the Cameron School District began to review its long-term facilities plan, its building configurations, and its educational program goals. Following a comprehensive facilities study, the District identified improvement measures over the next decade that would extend the useful life of the school district's buildings and advance how we educate our children. The study assessed and recommended addressing aging infrastructure, outdated learning environments, safety \& security.
A Facility Task Force was assembled to research and discuss the improvement measures. They were charged with providing community input to the Cameron School Board on the following items:

1. The District's capital needs
2. The District's overall operating budget
3. Possible/potential referendum
On January 23, 2023, the Board of Education approved a resolution to pursue a bond for $\$ 6,100,000$ on April 4, 2023 following the recommendation from the Task Force.
What is included in the facility improvement plan?
The facility improvement plan is a comprehensive list of building and ground improvements needed over the next ten years to not only increase the life of the high school and middle school buildings, but also to address some issues within the District related to educational and student support services. The list of measures below explains the significant projects included in the referendum question, but does not identify all of the needs reported in the comprehensive facility plan.

- Safety:

Safe and secure entry, and office improvements for student services

- Building \& Site Repairs: Replace building indoor air
quality and environmental controls to improve performance while lowering utility expense.
- District-Wide Capital Purchase:
District transportation vehicles (replacement buses, outdated school vans)
The referendum was recently approved. Get excited for the improvements!
