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
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Best Wishes Don Rappel



Memory Project

The Memory Project is a nonprofit organization that was founded in 2004. It all started with Ben Shumaker, a college student driven to make a difference in the world. He said, "I was passionate about connecting youth around the world through art to help build cultural understanding and international kindness."

Mrs. Angie Leschisin brought this project to her students and seven Cameron High schoolers chose to participate in this heart-warming project. Each student received a portrait of a child and were tasked with creating a realisite drawing. When the artists finish their pieces, they trace their hand on the back, take a picture of themselves holding the artwork, and write a couple words to their child, reminding them that they matter and even though they're in a different country, they care about them. These pictures mean so much to the children who receive them. They are from areas where events

such as natural disasters, wars, and poverty runs rampant.

"The Memory Project gets its name from its first intention, which was to provide handmade, heartfelt portraits as special memories to children in orphanages. Now our intention has expanded to touching the lives of youth around the world facing many types of challenges, while opening our hearts and minds so they can touch ours in return," explains Ben Schumaker.

When all the portraits are submitted, Ben will gather them and bring them to the children directly. He brings a video crew and records some of the reactions to the artwork. The video is then curated and sent to us to show us that they were received and well liked.

Not only is this project for a good cause, it is also enhancing the student's artistic ability. Kaylynn Ewald, a Cameron High School senior, says, "It is a really good opportunity to

diversify portrait making skills."
