The Cameron Comets baseball team is looking for similar success that they found at the end of the season last year, winning regionals over the Chetek-Weyerhaeuser Bulldogs. Although last year's record of 6 wins and 15 losses doesn't come out and shock you, the 2022 team is looking to make a shockwave throughout the Heart O' North conference. Only losing two seniors from last year and having 10 returning varsity players, this Comet team is once again led by young talent. Nine of the players are underclassmen while four seniors are looking to lead the team another sectional run this season.

hitters in total while earning 2nd team All-Conference honors. With Nine games pitched already on the year he has surpassed 79 strikeouts, almost passing his last season totals.

Behind the plate, Senior Ashtyn Waite batted .295 with 11 RBI's las year, also earning 2nd team All-Conference. Junior Luke Salm had the best fielding percentage in the outfield with a .933 having 14 putouts.

Last season the Comets had a difficult time with the strikeout bug; hitters struck out 151 times. Pitching had a combined total of a 8.40 ERA, and fielding had 41 total errors. They are looking to stop those errors with the combination of sophomore shortstop Kory Murray, second baseman Mathias Weber, and Wyatt Halverson, and third basemen Gannon Ebert and Brady Quinn to create a strong infield. While senior Reagan Bartsch, Luke Salm, and sophomore Kobe Sevals hold down the outfield. The Comets sit at 7-10 on the season as they look to find a hot steak to help end the month of May.

Meanwhile off the field, the Comet Youth Baseball program received a \$15,000 grant from the Minnesota Twins. The grant will be used to touch up Sportsman's Park in the center of the village so the Youth Baseball Program will fuel the future Comet batters.

The Cameron Comets softball team entered an uncertain year as they lost two seniors from last year. As of May 18, the team sits at a 5-14 record for the season with wins over Ladysmith, Chetek, Barron and a very dominating victory over Ashland 12-2.

The Comets have a very bright future--and have two seniors, Cali Romsos and Ahna Andersen. Andersen reflected on this season by saying, "This year has been a rebuilding year for Cameron High School Softball. The relentless winter weather and slow start to the season has been a challenge, but the challenge has only brought us closer as a team. We are starting to see the togetherness bring us wins on the field and form the best harmony amongst players we have seen all season. I am so grateful to be a part of a team that believes in me as much as I believe in each one of them. I take pride in how far we have come and I have faith in how far we will go."

This team is very junior-heavy with six, three sophomores, and three freshmen rounding out the varsity team. Most of the team have had varsity experience from last season even though they lost a key player and pitcher Avery Krahenbuhl, last year due to graduation. One of this year's key players for the Comets is junior Gretta Hall. She has been tearing it up at the plate batting an average of .462 with two home runs. Junior Khalia Evans is batting .364 with a OBP (On Base Percentage) of .458, and Junior Zoe Rubenzer is third on the team in batting average with .250.

On the mound, junior Ashlie Falstad has led the team in pitching with 30.1 innings pitched and has thrown over 525 pitches and a record 30 strikeouts while Gretta Hall has pitched 11.2 innings and has 15 strikeouts.

The Comets are looking to build on momentum before the season winds down.
