Attendance

Here is some information to help

understand the Cameron School District Attendance Policy. We believe that a strong attendance record correlates to strong academic performance. In the case of a student's absence, it is important to consider our school policy, which follows State Statute. Students who miss school for any reason are marked absent for any classes they miss. According to Wisconsin State Statute 118.15 and 118.16, students are allowed 10 excused absences in the course of the school year. Excused absences include illness or medical appointments, parent approved travel, family emergency, or other pre-planned appointments. Any absences after the 10 excused will be considered unexcused unless caused by medical issues or other extenuating circumstances. Please call the office or provide a written note to ensure absences are excused. Text messages to your student will result in a phone call home. Unexcused absences will result in truancy. Habitual truancy happens when a student is unexcused for all or part of 5 days. If a student is habitually truant, communication will be made to parents and a conference will be scheduled. We hope to avoid referrals to the city and county by working with families to keep the student in class. We appreciate your support of our policy by talking with your student about attendance.
